Georgia Connections Academy is an accredited, public charter school currently serving students in grades K-12 from across the state of Georgia. Our students come from urban, suburban, and rural communities. The school was originally founded during the 2011-12 school year as a K-8 school. Georgia Connections Academy added high school during the 2012-13 school year and graduated its first class May 2013.

OUR PROGRAM

Georgia Connections Academy includes a four-year comprehensive high school program with an enrollment of 3,250 students. Here are some important facts about the program:

- Georgia Connections Academy is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges & Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement (SACS CASI), an accrediting division of Cognia.
- The district has over 341 certified/ licensed professional staff. Of those, over 243 have earned advanced degrees and all are highly qualified. Of those, 3 staff members hold a doctorate.
- School is in session 180 days between the months of August and May.
- Active chapters with the National Beta Club, National Honor Society, National Art Honor Society, National English Honor Society, National Math Honor Society, Social Studies Honor Society, Science National Honor Society, and Spanish National Honor Society.

Georgia Connections Academy's core curriculum is geared toward preparing students for college and beyond. Students have access to AP, Honors, College Preparatory, and On-Level programs. Students also can participate in Georgia's Dual Enrollment program, in which they can earn dual high school and college credit by attending post-secondary institutions.

AP course offerings include: Biology, Calculus AB, Computer Science, Computer Science Principles, English Language, English Literature, Environmental Science, Human Geography, Macroeconomics, Psychology, Statistics, US Government, and US History.




GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

GACA operates on a semester system utilizing Carnegie units. One semester class equals one-half of a high school credit. Students who have taken high school level courses while in middle school may have been granted high school credit. The typical course load is six classes per semester.

Advanced Placement Scores

Out of 216 testers, we had 13 AP scholars, 6 AP scholars with honor, 5 AP scholars with distinction. At least 85% of students in AP Government, AP Pre-Calc and AP Literature earned a level 3 or higher. We had a 100% pass rate in AP Government.

GRADE SCALE

Student transcripts reflect weighted grades if the student took Honors or AP courses. The numerical grading scale is as follows:

Class rank is calculated twice each year, at the conclusion of each semester. Class rank is based upon the student's cumulative weighted GPA through their 1st semester of senior year, including transfer courses.
